How to use this document

This document is a DRAFT of the Master Signage Plan. It shows the location of the new signs to be installed for *The Ellerslie Loop* Trail, as well as existing signs on the trail. Photos are used to illustrate where new signs will be installed, they are also used to explain situations, for example overgrown paths, places where signs are not located and should be. Also included is some of the brochure content proposed for each point of interest – this is a 'work in progress' and to be finalised in collaboration with Orakei Local Board. The brochure content will also help guide users around the trail and highlight opportunities to take a rest and enjoy hospitality and retail in the local area. Major points of interest are indicated from 'A' to 'J' and will be added to the map once agreed.

ELLERSLIE RACECOURSE


Signs within racecourse grounds are highlighted yellow. Ellerslie Racecourse must be consulted prior to signs going up in the grounds. A trailhead near the Ibis hotel/hospital would be very valuable. A suitable location should be negotiated with Ellerslie Racecourse for a trailhead sign. Possible location would be near Gate 3 (below left) directing people through carpark and to racecourse gardens via Gate 6 (below right).



TRAIL MARKERS

An example of a trail marker is shown below for reference. Trail markers on existing lamp-posts should be located at eye level to a walker approximately 5ft. A similar trail marker sign would be developed for this trail. Trail markers are directional and are used to assure people they are on the trail.

FROM CONCEPT NOTE – The Ellerslie Loop Trail – In Top Form

The 'In Top Form' theme melds together strong associations of 'place' with the horse (racecourse), organic foods, and the community aspects of Ellerslie.

Take a stroll past the heritage buildings that give Ellerslie its village feel, or go shopping at one of the organic stores. Maybe pick up supplies for a picnic and explore the green spaces of Ellerslie and the Paptuanuku ki Taurangi organic garden. Or enjoy the range of cafés, restaurants, and specialized food outlets. The trail will improve linkages between parks and walkways, cultural and heritage attractions, and local shopping areas, which will offer a diverse experience that moves beyond mere shopping. Overall this will generate a distinctive sense of place for visitors and locals alike.

The trail will target groups ranging from families, to age groups 24+, foodies, and people interested in organic food. It does so by including different elements along the trail such as organic shopping, dining, enjoyment of green spaces and heritage attractions. An increased understanding of the natural and cultural gems that are present in Ellerslie will provide residents with the opportunity to maintain and build a strong sense of local identity and pride in their own neighbourhood – and then bring their visiting friends and relatives to see 'their place


Introduction

An easy walk or short bike ride will show you the sights of this place – an enjoyable morning or afternoon activity. Ellerslie is just 9 km south-east from Auckland's

Bridge of Memories and Tree of Life



This Bridge connects the train station to Ellerslie Township and spirals around a Norfolk pine – 'the tree of life'. The mosaics on the Bridge of Memories tell the story of our place in colourful community art work reflecting past and present Ellerslie. The *tree of life* is a landmark here symbolising the vibrant heart of our passionate community. The Borough of Ellerslie was formally declared on April 1, 1938 and was founded much earlier by Robert Graham in 1848. A crest created to symbolise the borough was composed of; a runner to represent its sporting history, a kiwi depicting the nation, a factory symbolizing industrial growth, and a tree depicting the environment. The horse racing town and its early settler history include Auckland's first zoo – exotic animals owned by the founder Robert Graham are also shown along with other murals reflecting Ellerslie's community's past and present.










The land on which Ellerslie is now situated was once a massive plantation of crops of kumara, potatoes and citrus trees providing food for the entire region. Fast forward in history and a large sign on the wall alongside the town square shows an insight into life here in the 1880s. Enjoy this space and watch the world go by, it's a great spot to eat lunch or enjoy a coffee, offering plenty of shade and seating. Designed in 2001 the square creates a sense of arrival and place and is designed to reflect the area's geological history adjacent to two lava flows, with six fountains creating water inspired by ephemeral springs. A great spot for kids in the summer to splash and play, and ride their bikes.

This community hall was built to commemorate those men and woman from Ellerslie killed in WWII. The poppy mural serves as a tribute to all who have served in the New Zealand armed forces, and was installed during the centenary of WWI remembering the bloody Gallipoli battle of 1915, where thousands of New Zealand servicemen lost their lives in Turkey on the Gallipoli coast.

Stables Theatre is situated inside the hall and is home to the Ellerslie Theatrical Society which performs regular theatre shows four times a year.

More beautiful mosaic art is here for you to enjoy, telling further colourful stories of Ellerslie. Look closely and you will see various native birds sitting among two trees which Ellerslie residents are very familiar with, the Norfolk pines are either ends of the town centre and the phoenix palm is a feature of the Ellerslie Racecourse.

Ladies Mile




Ladies Mile is the street leading to the right, cross the junction at the pedestrian refuge and continue up Ladies Mile.

The origins of the name of this street is contested. Some say that it is named after Mrs Graham who married Robert Graham in 1852. Close to the family homestead at the top of Ladies Mile, the story goes that every morning Mrs Graham would ride her horse on this bridle track. A more unsavoury story goes that it was named after a famous street in London, known for its ladies of the night. Whatever the reason, the name stuck.

- 1. Look to your immediate left and you will see a door which leads to a stairway. An urban myth has it that in the 1800s this building (which later became the pharmacy building) was a well to do 'gentlemen's club'. The story goes that one evening, two eminent businessmen were fighting over a most lovely lady, when one was pushed off the balcony to his death. The murder was thereafter covered up with no investigation and no mention in the press. At night, locals continue to report a spooky feeling on these stairs. Later on in 1948, Max Ward set up the pharmacy here. He was known for living here and for making his own potions, he owned the chemist for 50 years.
- 2. Auckland's first organic shop which began trading in 1984 becoming New Zealand's first organic store is located on this street. Today it continues to provide an ever-expanding range of organic and natural products to customers far and wide. Also on this corner is the Mercy Op Shop, much loved by locals and offering an ever changing array of treasures to peruse.



Christ Church

Christ Church is the Anglican Church which has been serving the parish of Ellerslie and Mount Wellington for over 130 years. The Anglican Christ Church is a significant image of Ellerslie, and was part of the original Graham Estate. This wooden gothic church was opened in 1883. Its most significant feature is a full set of stained glass windows gifted to the congregation by the English firm of Clayton and Bell, glassmakers to Queen Victoria. Clayton and Bell designed and made the great west window of St Georges Chapel at Windsor Castle in commemoration of the marriage of the Prince of Wales. They also made the great west window in King's College, Cambridge, and the windows in a number of other great English cathedrals.

Stroll up Ladies Mile and notice the many different architectural styles, some of which are classic New Zealand villas. Turn left off Ladies Mile down Morrin Street.

Continue on Morrin Street past Lonsdale Street (on your right) and past Robert Street on your left.

When you reach Somerfield Street cross the road to your right (Morrin Street) and go through the gate marked 'Gate 9' with signs for Lollipops Playland and Café and Ellerslie Racecourse.

Walk through the gate and at the fork turn left following signs for Lollipops Playland and Ellerslie Racecourse.

Ellerslie Racecourse

Māori gave the name 'Waiatarua' to the site which is now the Ellerslie Racecourse. Translated as "two songs" the name refers to a waiata or song that emanated from underground caves. It was believed that this 'singing' was created by water and air blowing from a larger cave into a smaller passage, making a vibrating sound.

Racing at Ellerslie began over 150 years ago in 1857. In the 1960s a new grand stand was constructed at the racecourse and the caves were filled with concrete to create a seal. This was not wholly successful, and it is said that the singing can still be heard coming from the caves.

Keep following the road past Lollipops Playland into the racecourse grounds through the gates and turn right following the road around towards the Racecourse Gardens.

It's unclear whether the racecourse (private/corporate) property would allow signs inside the grounds. There are two business signs within the grounds but these are around the back and not in main areas. Ellerslie Racecourse should be consulted re the installation of signs in the grounds.

Getting to the Racecourse from here two options for signage are proposed below –YELLOW INDICATES THAT THE PROPOSED SIGNS ARE WITHIN THE RACECOURSE GROUNDS

There are three options for wayfinding this part of the trail:

- 1. Explain brochure content really well and show with a detailed map no signage
- 2. Follow the road and loop back better route but signage could be an issue as is front and centre of the racecourse grounds
- 3. Follow the path and double back not as good a route but negotiating signage could be easier

OPTION 1 – follow the road in front of Events Centre to Racecourse gardens and loop around.



This route leads you in front of Ellerslie Event Centre and through the centre of the Racecourse Gardens, looping around the back to exit out of Gate 7 onto Morrin Road

Racecourse Gardens

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During the early 1870s Robert Graham turned a portion of his estate into the 'Ellerslie Zoological Gardens'. A racecourse, and gardens made Ellerslie a place for socialising and leisure. They were later named the Racecourse gardens. Today these gardens reflect the horse racing traditions that have carried on here. The bronze horse statue marks where the world famous racehorse Sunline is buried and celebrates her achievements. Take your time to enjoy these beautiful manicured gardens and grounds, long enjoyed by the Ellerslie community.

Follow the purple exit signs towards the back of the grounds, just before the exit gate you will see a shrub like tunnel beside the manicured gardens on the left, and beside this road closed to traffic with a white gate. Walk past the white gate and follow the road around to Gate 7.

Exit via Gate 7 and continue back (turning left) along Morrin Street. Turn right down Somerfield Street, then left onto Tecoma Street. Next turn right onto Harrod Street and loop back to the bridge of memories, turning right at the end of Harrod Street onto Robert Street.









ELLERSLIE

Before the Racing Town

Among the first inhabitants of the Auckland region were descendants of Rangatira Toi-te-huatahi who migrated north from Whakatane to the Tamaki River during the 12th century but relationships between iwi and hapu were subject to shifting alliances and disputes. The land on which Ellerslie is now situated was once a massive plantation of crops of kumara, potatoes and citrus trees providing for the entire region.

The Racing Town

Racing at Ellerslie began over 150 years ago in 1857. In the 1960s a new grand stand was constructed at the racecourse and the caves were filled with concrete to create a seal. This was not wholly successful, and it is said that the singing could still be heard coming from the caves.

Emergence of the Township

In 1848 a young Scottish Enterprenuer, Robert Graham purchased two blocks of land bounded by Great South road and Panmure roads. He originally wanted to name the emerging township Elderslie after his family home in Larnarkshire, however the name was altered to 'Ellerslie' either as a result of a clerical error or due to the existence of a town called Elderslie in Otago. Many of the local streets bear names of Graham family members.

Ellerslie Town District was established in May 1908, and the borough of Ellerslie was formally declared in 1938 and came to an end in 1989 when the boundaries of Auckland City were enlarged to incorporate numerous local bodies in the region.

Several historic buildings from the old township still exist today, including the Ellerslie Post Office Building built in 1911 and the Anglican parish of Ellerslie Christ Church built in 1883.
